CRITERION I - CURRICULAR ASPECTS

1.1 - Curriculum Planning and Implementation

1.1.1 - Institution has the mechanism for well planned curriculum delivery and documentation. Explain in 500 words

The college is affiliated to the University of Calcutta and abides by the university prescribed curriculum of 1+1+1 system and the Choice Based Credit System (CBCS), which was introduced in the academic year 2018-19 in undergraduate and postgraduate courses. The institution is committed to effectively delivering the prescribed curricula in a systematic manner and the following actions have been taken to ensure the same: i) Institutional Calendar: In addition to the University Academic Calendar, the institutional calendar is prepared giving academic and administrative details, such as commencement of session, number of working and teaching days, list of holidays, probable dates of Internal Assessments, Tutorial examinations (Project and Viva- Voce), semester evaluations, University and college examinations. The above details are displayed on the notice boards and on the College Website. ii) Prospectus: The prospectus introduces the students to the vision, mission and goals of the institution. It provides detailed information regarding the eligibility criteria and procedure for admission. iii) Time Table: The time-table drafted by a designated routine committee specifies the allocated slots for theory, practical, tutorial and remedial classes taken by the respective teachers. Suitable slots are also kept for Departmental talk, students' seminars, conferences and library hours. iv) Attendance Register: The registers are maintained to keep a record of the attendance of students in theory, practical, tutorial and remedial classes of both honours and general programmes. This helps in documenting the monthly attendance of the students which is later displayed on the respective Departmental notice boards. v) Effective distribution and completion of syllabus: The IQAC requests the teachers to submit teaching plans along with the implementation report of the previous session/semester to record the extent of syllabus covered within the stipulated time.. vi) ICT: There are six classrooms which are ICT enabled including one room with lecture capturing facility. This facilitates the teaching-learning process and makes it entertaining while recording classroom lectures for future reference. vii) Orientation and Evaluation: To ensure continuous internal assessment the Departmental teachers regularly interact with students evaluating them orally and through written class tests. The college expands the learning horizon of the students by going beyond the curricular framework by regularly organizing Departmental seminars, excursions, book exhibitions and putting up wall magazines. viii) Library: The college has one Central and fourteen Seminar libraries. Besides, the Departments of Bengali, Physics and Zoology have

separate libraries for their postgraduate students. The fully air-conditioned Central Library covers an area of 3000 sq. ft. (approx.) and contains a total number of 45018 books and 25 journals. ix) Miscellaneous: The college allows the teachers to attend the Orientation Programmes, Refresher and other Short Term Courses/ Workshops with a view to upgrade their knowledge base in order to aid the process of curriculum delivery.

1.4.2 - How the feedback obtained is being analyzed and utilized for overall development of the institution? (maximum 500 words)

Feedback Obtained

Students' Feedback: (No. of Respondents: 383) Students' feedback are taken from the final year Hons. students. Students are satisfied with the learning value of the course content but they have some doubts about the applicability in the current job market. The students feel that they had to put in a lot of effort to master the course. Alumni Feedback: (No. of Respondents: 63) Majority of exstudents from whom feedback was taken feel that the curriculum is very well designed. They also feel that the college encourages cocurricular and extracurricular activities. More than 80 of the exstudents find that activities organised by the college for students' overall development is excellent. 90 of the respondents gave positive response on the initiatives of the placement cell. Teachers' Feedback: (No. of Respondents: 53) Analysis of the teachers' feedback reveals that 60 of them believe that the standard of academic programmes is similar to that of other universities. 79 of teachers assert that sufficient reference materials are available. 94 feel that text books and learning resources are adequate, updated and connected to the syllabus however 2 of the teachers disagreed with the above statement. 67 teachers feel that syllabus is properly sequenced. However it must be remembered that the syllabus is formulated by the parent university hence no changes are possible. Parents' Feedback: (No. of Respondents: 276) Parents are satisfied with the teaching learning evaluation process as well as the academic ambience of the college. Employers' Feedback Sri Sourabh Mukhopadhyay, Director, Shushrusha Nursing Home Private Limited suggested that in this era of globalization mere gaining of theoretical changes is not enough. He emphasized on soft skill development so that young graduates can conduct themselves with smartness and dignity in interview boards and impress employers/ industrialists. He proposed a one day motivation camp for our students. The feedback from Students, Parents, Alumni and Teachers were analysed and necessary corrective action have been taken. The college authority communicated the feedback to the concerned stakeholders. Keeping in mind the needs of the students, the curriculum delivery is suitably adjusted. It must be remembered that our institution is an affiliated one having little control over the curriculum, which is determined by Calcutta University. So we rearrange the topics to suit the needs of the students. Usually we try to acquaint our students with the basic concepts of the subject in Semester I and sustain their interest in the course to make learning a pleasant experience. Extension lectures, excursions, student projects, seminars and wall magazines are also arranged. Rote learning is usually discouraged. Action Taken: The IQAC analyzed the feedback and communicated the same to the stakeholders.

Every teacher makes an analysis of the strengths, weaknesses, opportunities and challenges of the mentee allotted to him/her. Mentoring is done to groom students for preparing student projects, student seminars and other curricular activities. The mentor - mentee system has created a close relationship between students and teachers. The teachers pay individual attention to the problems of mentees and offer counselling. The slow and weak learners are given special attention, while advanced learners are challenged to explore the depths of the discipline. The combined efforts of mentors and mentees have improved the academic ambience of each Department. This is reflected in the academic performance of students.

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2.5.2 - Reforms initiated on Continuous Internal Evaluation(CIE) system at the institutional level (250 words)

As a result of the introduction of the Choice Based Credit System (CBCS) during 201819 by the University of Calcutta, the system of continuous internal evaluation has received a boost. For each course the internal assessment is 20 of the full marks. It comprises of marks on attendance and internal examination. Course wise attendance of each subject is recorded by each Department of the college. Internal examinations are scheduled in the 3rd week of November/May for Odd/Even semesters. Another 15 of the total marks of a course is assigned to tutorial or 30 of the total marks of a course is assigned to practical examinations. The tutorial examinations comprises of wide ranging programmes such as student projects, group discussions, student presentation, field trips etc. So we can say that after introduction of CBCS reforms in the CIE has been institutionalized. Even before the introduction of CBCS, in the 111 system (which is still continuing for students registered in 2017) our college had a system of CIE. Each honours Department holds periodic tests, the

results of which along with attendance record are conveyed to the parents through report cards. For all students midterm examinations and college tests are held.

2.5.3 - Academic calendar prepared and adhered for conduct of Examination and other related matters (250 words)

The institution adheres to the academic calendar of the University of Calcutta and on the basis of the university calendar, prepares its own specific institutional calendar. All examinations, publication of results, admission and other related academic matters are done in accordance with the academic calendar. Classes are held and meetings of the Governing Body, Teachers' Council, Academic SubCommittee and IQAC are organized in a planned manner so that the academic schedule is not disrupted and students do not suffer. Teachers, too prepare their Teaching Plans in accordance with the Academic Calendar.

4.4.2 - Procedures and policies for maintaining and utilizing physical, academic and support facilities - laboratory, library, sports complex, computers, classrooms etc. (maximum 500 words) (information to be available in institutional Website, provide link)

Emphasis has been given on optimal utilization of campus infrastructure (i.e. classrooms, laboratories, etc.) with minimum overlapping. The institution has introduced log book system to facilitate the optimal use of gymnasium equipments and computers available in different laboratories. Due to the paucity of smart classrooms and ICT enabled classrooms as well as seminar halls, Departments are allowed to use these facilities on a rotational basis. For better utilization of College Library, library rules and regulations have been framed so that users can borrow certain number of books and return them within a stipulated period of time. In this regard, users are informed promptly after issuing/returning a particular book about his/her present status of lending via email alert or sms. For maintenance of physical, academic and support facilities, different sub-committees have been constituted with the active participation of the head of the institution as well as selected members. The Building sub-committee has been entrusted with the maintenance, repair and construction work related to the building and furniture of the institution. New construction, repair and maintenance, painting, etc. of the three buildings and physical infrastructure like water and power supply, plumbing, etc. is looked after by this sub-committee. The college has a generator for uninterrupted power supply and it is maintained by experienced technicians (on call basis) as per requirement. The classroom items like benches, desks, boards, etc. are well maintained by the carpenters selected through tender notification on institution website, as per Government rules. Budgetary provisions are made for all the laboratory based Departments. Besides, laboratories of the institution maintain stock register for keeping a list of chemicals, glassware and any other instrument used in the laboratory. Maintenance for different laboratory instruments, machines, etc. is done by hired technicians. The Library sub-sommittee is constituted of faculty members from all academic Departments as well as representative from students. The committee, as per the budgetary provisions or funds available, takes decisions regarding the Departmental allotment, mode of purchase, and maintenance of existing books. It also organizes different programmes, such as

celebration of 'Library Day' and 'Book Fair Little Magazine Fair'. Besides, the library is using different Open Source Softwares, like KOHA, Wikimedia, Omeka, Moodle, etc. and hosting database using cloud server on a 24 × 7 basis. The institution has signed a MoU with Bengal Library Association on June, 2019 to look after these tasks.

- In accordance with the policy of decentralization adopted by the management, both teaching and nonteaching members are adequately represented in the Governing Body of the college . Apart from the GB meetings, IQAC, SubCommittees like Provident Fund Committee, Academic subcommittee, Examination SubCommittee, various students' support and progression Sub Committees, ParentTeacher meets, Grievance Cell etc meet on a regular basis and help to formulate and implement the strategic plans of the institution. The responsibilities are defined and communicated by various means. • Case study 1: o One case study showing practice of decentralization and participative management in the institution may be found in the Provident Fund Committee of the college. o This Committee works in strict compliance with the rules and regulations of the C.S. Branch of the Education Department of the Government of West Bengal. o Management of the Fund is vested in the GB. o Each wholetime employee is a subscriber to this fund. o Our PF fund is controlled by Pay and Accounts II, Kolkata and the Principal of the college is the chief signatory. o A senior Associate Professor and a Senior Office Clerk are the joint Conveners of the committee with 7 other ordinary members. o When a fulltime employee applies for advance/nonrefundable withdrawals from his/her fund, the PF committee meets promptly and sanctions the amount after scrutiny of the accounts and GB recommendation. The advance is recovered from the subscriber in 24 equal monthly installments. In the financial year 201819, 2 non teaching and 3 teaching staff members have received their refundable/nonrefundable loans. Before implementation of any important measure the Principal discusses it with the different stake holders in meetings, funds are mobilized and

decisions are taken. For instance, there exists a purchase committee constituted by the Governing Body. o Before every semester commences, the heads of the various Departments are asked what instruments and larger purchases their Department needs to make in order to meet the requisite specifications in the syllabus. o The HODs give their requirements in writing, describing the instrument etc in great detail and also stating the approximate costs o Tenders of the instruments which cost more than Rs 10,000 are invited on the college website and after the tenders come in, HODs sort through the various tenders and choose the one that meets their criteria and also costs the least.

• The College makes a conscious effort at conserving its green landscape, a unique feature of the College, and has taken steps in this direction. The primary objective of Vasudha (the Nature Club of the College) since its very inception has been to generate awareness about the need for ecological conservation and to inculcate a sense of familiarity of people with their surrounding biodiversity. Committee members and volunteers of the club have been extremely enthusiastic in this regard. • The NSS and Vasudha have been instrumental in encouraging the planting of trees and saplings in and around the College premises. Such plantation activities were carried out during the Forest Week. • Like every year, a very significant part of the Foundation Day celebrations of the College involved planting of saplings. • Seasonal flower garden and medicinal plant garden have also been maintained. • Another significant initiative of Vasudha has been to conserve natural resources by protecting important plant varieties from extinction. Vasudha maintains a mango orchard spreading across 4000 sq. feet of land on the College campus under the supervision of the West Bengal Biodiversity Board. • In order to make space for the construction of a new building, essential for the development of the College, a major initiative has been taken. 9 trees were successfully transplanted to different places with the approval from KMC and the Forest Department. The Nature's Nest, an NGO did the transplantation professionally with the help of hydraulic crane and other equipments. • In its larger concern to play a constructive role in reducing the level of pollution in the environment, the College encourages the use of ecofriendly means of transport like bicycles by both students as well as staff members. The College has a bicycle stand where the students and staff members can park their bicycles during college hours. • The College provides its learners with a plasticfree and clean

campus. Conscious attempts have been made by the staff members as well as students to achieve this objective. In this regard the contribution made by the two functional units of the National Service Scheme (NSS) of the College is significant. Students are encouraged by the NSS to actively participate in the campus cleaning drive of the Collegeas part of the Swachh Bharat Abhijan. • Motivated by the motto of the International Environment Movement Think Globally Act Locally, the College campus has been turned into a plastic free and no smoking zone. • The College has a partially paperless office. Soft copies of database are usually maintained. Notifications pertaining to examination schedules, admission procedure, publication of merit lists, etc. are periodically uploaded on the website. There is also an EProspectus of the College available on the official website. The College is making efforts towards gradually lessening the use of paper and it hopes to have a papeeless offive eventually.
