1.1.1 - The Institution ensures effective curriculum delivery through a well planned and documented process	
<p>Gurudas College, affiliated to Calcutta University, follows the CBCS curriculum from the academic year 2018-19.</p> <p>During the pandemic, departments have taken classes in the online mode. From December 2020, the college activated a free Plan through Google Workspace for Education, the Domain being gurudas.education. Another Domain, also with recording facilities, gdcgen.education, was activated from January 2021 for BA-B.Com General students. The links of the classes are shared with the students.</p> <p>Teachers also took classes through G Meet, posted study material on Google Classrooms and uploaded E Content on YouTube under GDC Media. Collaborating with IQAC, various departments arranged webinars by inviting well known academicians.</p> <p>The college has 9 classrooms with LCD facilities, including one</p>	

where lectures can be recorded. The students are evaluated through oral interactions, written class tests, University prescribed Tutorial Assignments, Internal Assessments and Theory examinations. The results are digitally prepared, uploaded on the University portal to generate the Statement of Marks.

Information about commencement of session, working days, list of holidays can be accessed from the Academic Calendar, college website and notice boards. The Central Library contains 48,173 books, 39 journals and question banks. Apart from 20 seminar libraries, Physics, Zoology, Bengali departments have libraries for postgraduate students.

1.1.2 - The institution adheres to the academic calendar including for the conduct of Continuous Internal Evaluation (CIE)

The college is transitioning towards a combination of formative and summative models of evaluation. Following CBCS, Calcutta University entrusts a considerable part of the assessment upon the colleges. Internal assessment is continuous. Students are evaluated on the basis of Attendance, Tutorials, Class tests, viva-presentation and research-oriented term papers. Lab-based subjects involve practical and final examinations, both of which are assessed by external examiners. Some departments award prizes to students with best attendance records.

The college is evolving methods of formative assessment through learner-centric methods. This reduces reliance on rote learning to encourage an autonomous learning process. It focuses on reducing stress and discourages undue emphasis on year-end examinations. The mentor-mentee groups complete given tasks while developing self-reliance, critical thinking and problem-solving abilities. Formative assessment is done through informal techniques such as group work, quizzes, class discussions and open book tests. These enable both teachers and students to assess the extent of learning while identifying and rectifying the shortcomings.

The significance of EdRP (Educational Resource Planning Tools) in CIE is undeniable. The college has automated some parts of the admission, registration and payment procedures. It benefits from online repositories like N-LIST, while trying to develop its own repository of e-content.

1.3.1 - Institution integrates crosscutting issues relevant to Professional Ethics, Gender, Human Values, Environment and Sustainability into the Curriculum

Environmental Studies, a compulsory course for UG students includes topics like Ecology and Ecosystems, Natural Resources, Biodiversity and Conservation, Environmental Pollution, Environmental Policies and Practices, Human Communities and the Environment. Awareness of the same is created among students by incorporating relevant topics in the different subjects.

History: Gender, environment, human values, socio-economic and political rights of different social classes.

Political Science: Syllabus covers Women's Movements and empowerment, Fundamental and Human Rights of Indian Citizens, Domestic Violence Act and Vishakha Guidelines.

Economics: Topics include Environmental Economics, microeconomics, Welfare economics, gender and wage gap and 'Environment and Sustainable Development'.

Sociology deals with gender as an analytical category in the epistemological framework.

Philosophy: Feminist Philosophy, Environmental Philosophy, Man and Environment directly deal with gender and environment issues.

Education analyses the social disability and exclusion of women through topics like Gender and Sexuality and Historical Perspectives of Women's Education in colonial India.

Sanskrit addresses topics like conservation of nature and biodiversity, structure of society and Position of Women in Society.

Bengali: Themes of gender, social relations, social marginalisation, and environment are incorporated.

English: Areas like Women's Writing, Literature and Human Rights become salient in multiple texts in the curriculum.

2.2.1 - The institution assesses the learning levels of the students and organizes special Programmes for advanced learners and slow learners

Gurudas College has employed CIE and mentor/mentee sessions as an effective tool of assessing learning levels and learning difficulties among students. This is over and above the university-mandated IA process. The college also sensitizes faculty on learning disabilities and promotes a compassionate approach towards students facing structural challenges owing to their marginalized backgrounds.

Advanced learners are encouraged to participate in student seminars/webinars, enroll for more advanced programs via NPTEL and participate in extension lectures that every department organizes. The college is making the transition towards a greater emphasis on undergraduate research in accordance with the mandate of the NEP 2020. High performance students are also given awards annually.

Slow learners are encouraged to participate in mentor/mentee sessions, remedial lessons and CIE to improve their problem-solving abilities and grasp complex topics. Students of all levels are encouraged to participate in the preparation of Wall Magazines, Departmental Magazines, and the in-house student magazine, Anweshana. The college has developed a CIE portal of its own to accommodate the needs of students and faculty.

2.3 - Teaching- Learning Process

2.3.1 - Student centric methods, such as experiential learning, participative learning and problem solving methodologies are used for enhancing learning experiences

Gurudas College strongly endorses modern student-centric methods of teaching-learning and has made a transition to the same with the introduction of CBCS. With large parts of the academic year still in the online mode due to the pandemic, some traditional modes of experiential learning such as study tours and f2f participatory groups in the brick-and-mortar classroom have been held in abeyance for now.

Gurudas College has encouraged advanced learners to make use of the existing digital archives (N-List, National Digital Library of India, Archive.org) and participate in national/international webinars/workshops in the Zoom era. Student webinars have been strongly encouraged to promote undergraduate research.

Learners with difficulties have been encouraged to use recordings of lectures made available to them for asynchronous study. First generation learners have been encouraged to use the Gurudas College Courseware website and other resources to bridge the digital divide. CIE has been emphasized upon for both learners with difficulties and first-generation learners.

Gurudas College has made the online transition with ease in the pandemic era. The college has a dedicated Google Suite platform that assimilates Google Meet, Drive and Classroom and allows teachers to hold live adequate lectures as well as record the same for asynchronous playback.

Teachers have used innovative tools such as Whatsapp to reach out

to students with irregular data/electricity access. The college e-resources website now boasts of a large compilation of open access resources for students and teachers, in order to promote teaching and learning in undergraduate levels. The YouTube channel GDC Media has a growing number of recorded webinars and lectures for students as well as the general public.

The college is equipped with 28 ICT-enabled classrooms, 6 smart classrooms and has wi-fi access in all three buildings. The college is in the continuous process of improving its internet infrastructure.

2.5.1 - Mechanism of internal assessment is transparent and robust in terms of frequency and mode. Write description within 200 words.

Gurudas College has developed a robust mechanism of continuous internal assessment (CIE), in accordance with the demands of the CBCS and in the spirit of the NEP 2020. The college has made large strides towards the incorporation of formative evaluation models alongside existing summative models of the same. The college library has already acquired an open source LMS, Moodle, for its Courseware website. It will be seeking to incorporate the same with greater enthusiasm. The college has already acquired G Suite with personal accounts for individual teachers, where they have used Google Meet, Google Forms and Google Classroom to facilitate formative assessment methods in the online/blended modes. Question banks have been made available on the college website for students to assess themselves in a self-paced approach. The college now has a dedicated CIE portal.

Apart from departmental CIE, the college also undertakes university-mandated internal assessment which includes tutorials, class tests, and practical examinations. These examinations are held once a semester, within a timeframe determined by the affiliating university.

Gurudas College ensures transparency in its internal assessment mechanism. Students are briefed on the workings of CIE as well as the university-mandated internal assessment process in the departmental orientation. Parents and other stakeholders are taken into confidence in parent-teacher meetings at regular intervals.

Students are sensitized on the dangers of plagiarism and assessment objectives are communicated efficiently to ensure student participation. Drafts are encouraged wherever possible for greater problem-solving approaches. Students are welcome to raise grievances with faculty concerned over informal channels (Whatsapp, personal communication), as well as through formal channels. The college has a formal exam-related grievance portal for this purpose. The college also plays an important role as an

interface between students and the affiliating university and takes on the responsibility of addressing any internal examination-related grievances that might be the purview of the university, such as the correction of marks in the case of errors.

- The college library is fully automated with the help of Koha (version 20.05), a library management software, on Debian 10 platform. Initially, in the 2010 to upgrade the library system, a Windows version of this software had been installed. From 2013 onwards however the Gurudas College Library has switched to the Linux version of the same.
- In 2018, the Gurudas College Library installed the RFID system. The task of tagging RFID stickers is going on.
- The task of data entry of library holdings in Koha is going on.
- Since 2012, the Library maintains a patrons' database, with

requisite details of patrons' information.

- RFID tagged membership cards are regularly issued for faculty members as well as college staff.
- Barcodes have been generated for books after entering them in Koha Library Management System. Each book entered into the system has two barcodes pasted on it, one in the front side and another one in the back side.
- Student membership cards have their own barcodes generated and pasted upon them.
- Barcode-based issue-return system is strictly followed.

The circulation system of college Library is supported by the automatic generation of e-mail as well as SMS alerts to each member. Each member is promptly informed about their circulation status, issue, return, reminder, etc.

- The Conference Room of the college is presently equipped with an exclusive another broadband connection from WishNet Pvt. Ltd. with a download speed of 150 Mbps.
- The Golden Jubilee Building (Library Building) has two separate fibre optic broadband connections from WishNet Pvt. Ltd., one in College Central Library and another in the Department of Journalism and Mass Communication, both have connections of 100 Mbps each.
- The Commerce Building is equipped with a 150 Mbps fibre

optic broadband connection from WishNet Pvt. Ltd. and has been distributed through WiFi throughout the building.

Teaching staff may offer themselves for assessment for promotion, if they fulfill the minimum API scores indicated in the appropriate API system tables by submitting an application and the required PBAS pro-forma as per the UGC Career Advancement Scheme guideline. Candidates who do not consider themselves eligible can also apply at a later date.

Non-Teaching staff are subject to promotion after a period of service not less than 7 years (skilled workers) or 10 years (all others).

There is also performance appraisal of the teaching staff by the outgoing final year students and the results are conveyed to the teacher so that they become aware of their shortcomings and take steps to correct them.

The new appraisal forms for students have other criteria as well, for appraisal of both teaching and office staff, and other aspects of the college. Teachers also receive a new self-appraisal form and there is a provision for students' feedback on the college website.

Students' guardians are also involved, as during every parent-teacher meeting, they are given a feedback form, and their valuable input regarding the department, quality of teaching, academic infrastructure available to their ward etc is collected and acted upon.

The college sends proposals for additional grants to the University Grants Commission (UGC) and West Bengal Department of Science and Technology (WBDST) in order to meet expenses for construction, repair and renovation of the college building and premises, and for up-gradation of infrastructure of the college and its various departments. The college moderates student's fee structure every year in order to procure additional funding. Other sources of income are library fines (LIB FINE), rent proceeds (the college rents out its premises on Sundays and other public holidays to be used as a centre for various competitive examinations; RNT CH RD) and sales proceeds (like sale of prospectus etc; SALES PRO).

Other than the routine Government and UGC grants, the institution has been able to secure additional funding from various agencies such as DST, Rashtriya Uchchatter Shiksha Abhiyan (RUSA) Grant, BOOST funds.
